The Just neighbors met for over 40 years before being dissolved. Mrs. Ed Virka who joined the club in March 1952 served as the president for eleven years until her death April 6, 1983.

Bluffs Gals Extension Club

The Bluffs Gals Extension Club was founded 1-10-1979. There were 7 members: Teri Chromy (president), Kathy Bauer (secretary-treasurer), Diane Hines, Debbie Kavan, Jeanne Kavan, Cindy Pollard and Joan Stenger.

In 1987 there are 12 members: Barb Anderson, Teri Chromy, Kathy Bauer, Diane Hansen, Deb Kavan, Alice Lorenzen, Linda Minarick, Barb Soukup, Sandy Soukup, Joan Stenger, Sharon Vrana and Holly Zakovec.

Some of the activities of the club include taking a spring tour, having a summer family picnic, working at the county fair, taking the husbands out to eat for Valentine meeting, participating in cultural arts pro-

The club meets the 2nd Monday of the month except during the summer. It is a young club. Every member has at least 1 child in school or younger. It is an active group which also enjoys the secret pal tradition.

4-H Clubs Bluffs Bobcats 4-H Club

The Bluffs Bobcats 4-H Club under the leadership of Rick and Debbie Hurst was organized in 1984 with 6 members: Paul and Jim Racek, Jack Zeleny, Ricky and Ben Hurst, and Matt Stricklin. In 1987 the membership roll is minus Paul Racek and has added Daniel and Kyle Ruppert.

Their projects include indoor and outdoor cooking, wildlife, forestry, and woodworking. They have exhibited at the fairs and have competed in judging competitions. Some are planning to enter the speech contest.

Clover Cuties 4-H Club

The Clover Cuties 4-H Club was one of the oldest clubs in the area. The leader, Mrs. Edward (Olga) Virka organized the group in 1959 and continued with it for almost 25 years. The club was dissolved when she died April 6, 1983. At times the membership exceeded 30. Most of their projects were in cooking, sewing and home living. The club gave a memorial in her name to the Saunders County 4-H Dept.

The members took part in speech contests, judging, dress revues, demonstrations and exhibits at county,

Fremont 4-H, and state fairs. Several members during those many years were winners of scholarships. Some were awarded trips to the 4-H Congress in Chicago or the National 4-H camp in Washington, D.C.

Clover Kids 4-H Club

The Clover Kids 4-H Club was organized in 1985. Teri Chromy is the organizational leader and Joan Stenger, the assistant leader. Members are Susan Cody, Stephanie and Shannon Stenger, Annie, Katie and Billie Chromy, Amy Vrana, Claire Vech, and Kris, Deb. Danielle and Rebecca Bauer.

The Clover Kids is a home economic club but has expanded to include small animals and poultry projects. The members have participated in the speech contest, county fair demonstrations, and judging contest. Community projects have been Christmas caroling, picking up litter on the main street of Morse Bluff, working at the county fair and making valentines for the nursing home.

Needle and Nails 4-H Club

The Needle and Nails 4-H Club was organized in June 1970 with Mrs. Elaine Borer and Mrs. Gladys Nemec as leaders. There were 11 charter members: Debbie, Virginia, Connie, Joe, Cindy, Mark and Jim Nemec, Thelma and Betty Borer, Amy Sloup and Diane Beranek.

Their various projects included cooking, sewing, home living, agriculture, woodworking, electrical, natural resources and horses. Among the club activities besides the regular fair exhibits and activities were sponsoring a Japanese exchange student one summer, taking part in exchange trips with 4-H people from other states, Christmas caroling to elderly residents in the rural area, conducting trash pick-up drives, and donating to the Eastern Nebraska 4-H Camp at Gretna, NE.

Only 3, Kris Nemec, Chris and Mike Borer, make up the membership in 1987. Elaine Borer Vech and Gladys Nemec continue as leaders as they have the past 13 years.

Ridge Riders 4-H Club

The Ridge Riders 4-H Club was organized about 20 years ago with Mrs. Durward Vosler as leader. Their horsemanship projects have netted them many awards at county and state fairs. Many top showmanship awards have also received. Last year one of the members entered in 11 classes and was awarded the top ribbon in 9.

In 1987 the Zakovec house is owned by Duane Pabian, The Buchholtz house by Wm. Vopalensky and the Urban house was located on 1st and Kate.

Western Fraternal Life Association

The Morse Bluff, "Nebraska" Western Fraternal Life Association Lodge Plzen #9, better known by its Czech ethnic name, Z.C.B.J. Lodge, was established in the community July 4, 1897. It succeeds an earlier Czech ethnic fraternal insurance society known as the C.S.P.S. The C.S.P.S. was chartered in Morse Bluff, before the village was incorporated, on June 6, 1880. It had been organized on the east coast and its settlements on claims were unfavorable to people in the Mid-west.

On July 4, 1897 fifty lodges of the newly formed Z.C.B.J. were designed "Charter Lodges". The Lodge at Morse Bluff was assigned the prestigious #9. The society originated in Omaha, Nebraska and later moved its headquarters to Cedar Rapids, Iowa. The W.F.L.A. has more than 5300 members nationwide. It is governed by an elected Board of Directors. Frank I. Vlasak, a former Morse Bluff resident and long time member of the Lodge, has been a National Director for the past sixteen years.

Lodge #9 at Morse Bluff ranks 14th in membership of the 42 Nebraska lodges. The local group has 232 members, many residing out of the state but retaining their membership in the Morse Bluff Lodge for family and sentimental reasons.

The Morse Bluff Lodge owns its own hall located on lots, 13, 14 and 15 of block 7. It is a unique cement block structure constructed in 1910. It attained national recognition in 1986 by being placed on the National Register of Historic Buildings in Washington, D.C. Much work has been done to preserve and restore the local landmark. The local members have given generously through contributions, memorials and donated labor for the building's preservation.

Meetings are held on the third Thursday of the month with the exception of June, July and August. Recognition has also been won in the past two years for its increased membership and charitable involvements as donations to the Volunteer Fire Depart-



ment, North Bend Rescue Squad, Food Pantry, Salvation Army and Statue of Liberty Fund. The Lodge has helped with the Village of Morse Bluff in sponsoring an Easter Egg Hunt. It has conducted tours of the building to groups of school children.

It works closely with the American Legion Post #340 of Morse Bluff. The Lodge holds its meetings in the Legion Club room. In turn the Lodge allows the Legion the use of their grounds and building for their barbecues and steak fries.

Membership in the Lodge does not restrict its membership except in felons. English is the spoken language at meetings and in its publication, the Fraternal Herald. Its Czech heritage and ethnic beginning are revered. Its motto is "Truth, Love and Loyalty".

The Z.C.B.J.-W.F.L.A. is Morse Bluff's oldest organization. As the community celebrates its centennial the local lodge celebrates its 90th year in Morse Bluff. It has every reason to believe it will continue to serve the community for generations to come.

Fleming Cemetery

Robert Fleming deeded a tract of land in section 10 to the Sand Creek Burying Ground Assocation in the early 1870's. Through the years it has been referred to as the Sand Creek Cemetery or more commonly, the Fleming Cemetery.

The cemetery may be the only one in this area that had a black family among its early settlers and they have children buried in this cemetery.

The cemetery is unusual in that no one has ever paid for a lot. In the past the care and mowing was by volunteer labor but in 1985 a group having families buried here set up a fund to provide for a caretaker. Most of the cemetery is still covered by native prairie grass, giving it an attractive appearance.

The Czech National Cemetery

Killian's or Killian's Hill


The Czech National Cemetery, better known locally as Killian's or Killian's Hill Cemetery, is located three miles west and one-half mile south of Morse Bluff, Nebraska. The legal description is 3.7 acres in the southeast corner of NW¼ of section 23, township 17, range 5 in Bohemia precinct. Its location high above the Platte River makes it one of the most scenic spots in the area.

This cemetery property is part of forty acres that make up the holdings of the cemetery association and was a part of a land grant from the Union Pacific railroad. The Killian family owned property on two sides of the cemetery hence the name Killian's hill and cemetery. In the 1907 Plat Map of Saunders County the cemetery is referred to as "Bohemian Cemetery" probably since most of the early settlers in Bohemia precinct were from the part of Europe known as Bohemia.

The acres set aside for the cemetery were officially recognized in 1875. Burials were made prior to that time but no records, if kept are available. There are approximately forty unmarked graves in the oldest part of the cemetery. Their markers may have been made of wood and have succumbed to the ravages of time.


There are 216 lots, each lot 20' by 20' designed for eight bodies if no monument is used. January 1, 1987, showed that there were 524 known and marked graves in the cemetery. An unusual feature is that the burials generally face south instead of the traditional east. There are three lots that do have bodies facing east.

The majority of persons buried in the cemetery were born Czechs or are descendents of that ethnic group. The cemetery association, however, has no restrictions on who may be interred.

In 1910 an association was formed and the name Czech National Cemetery was legally adopted. This name appears in the Czech language over the center gate. Some confusion exists that the cemetery is owned by the Z.C.B.J. Lodge of Morse Bluff. The two groups are two different organizations, completely different and independent of one another. Anyone having a family member buried in the cemetery is considered a member of the association. An annual meeting is held in March. It is publicized and open to all with an interest in the cemetery. A body of six trustees, two elected every year for a term of three years, govern the cemetery. A reorganization of the association occurred in 1965. The rules and regulations were translated into English and brought up to date in 1984. In 1982 the cemetery association was incorporated as a non-profit corporation under the statutes of the State of Nebraska. In 1985 its records were computerized. Every trustee maintains a complete record of all finances and interments.




Scott's Lake, 1987

Scott's Lake


What memories this place recalls! There were Sunday School, Public School, Masonic Lodge and family picnics plus many other gatherings. Swimming, fishing, boating and baseball games were enjoyed in the summer. Ice skating with bonfires and wiener roasts were highlights in the winter. Remember the challenge of seeing how near the open spring water one could come without getting wet.

For over 50 years Scott's Lake was the site of Fourth of July celebrations. Where else could one go for a dime, the cost per person to cross the bridge to enter the grounds? A bottle of pop cost a nickel as did a hamburger or hot dog. A glass of beer was a dime. To climax the day fireworks of great beauty both in the sky and in the water's reflection entertained all. A dance would complete the celebration.

Dances of all types were part of the history of Scott's Lake, not to mention a fist fight from time to time. How many recall meeting their spouses there or dancing to Lawrence Welk with the south breezes blowing the Oriental lanterns? Many have memories of climbing trees, falling into the lake accidently or on




Scene at Scott's Lake about 1905

purpose, riding the merry-go-round and those outdoor "restrooms"?

Scott's Lake located one and one-half miles east of Morse Bluff was first owned by John Garrett who received the land in a patent from the Union Pacific. A short time later he sold it to Elias Beasley. In 1886 J.P. Scott bought the lake and surrounding acres. He and his family developed the lake and acres north of the lake as a recreational area — hence the name Scott's Lake. At one time they had both a steam driven boat and carousel. The boat was not too successful but the carousel continued for many years.

In June 1917 Joseph Bauer purchased Scott's Lake. He built the dance hall while he was the owner. Emil E. Wolf became the owner in 1920. He leased the dance hall and grounds to various individuals. Sometime in the twenties, additions were built on the east and west sides of the dance hall, providing a stage, ladies lounge, a storage room, a kitchen area and a bar. In February 1929 John Vopalensky purchased Scott's Lake. His family retained possession after his death in 1959. Regular dances were discontinued in the early fifties and dances were on a limited basis. A flood in 1960 washed out the bridge. The public no longer used the grounds for picnics.

Changes have taken place since Stephen Flott purchased the Scott's Lake acres. Buildings have been torn down, a new road has been built to gain access to the grounds. The acres have been divided into parcels and what the future holds for Scott's Lake remains to be seen.

Ice Houses and Ice Making

In the early years before the electric coolers and refrigerators, making ice for use in the warm days was cold winter business for several. Ice houses were made for the purpose of storing ice. Some were built above ground to about two stories high with no windows. There were doors at various levels to get to the ice. There were two of this type on the south side of Scott's Lake where most of the ice was made and one in Morse Bluff on the north side of the railroad tracks near the present County Maintenance Building, The ice house in town was built a few feet into the ground with a floor built a few feet above the ground. Cakes of ice were placed around the bottom walls forming a cooling chamber where taverns could store and cool their beer. Zakovec and "Sticks" Ladenburger, both operating taverns, also had their own ice houses behind their taverns. These were dug into the ground, lined with tile, and had a roof over them. Several farmers in the area also had this type of ice house on their farms.

Ice making usually took place at Scott's Lake when the ice had frozen to a depth of twelve or more inches. Ice saws were used to cut the ice into blocks about the size of a bale of hay but weighing about two to three hundred pounds. These blocks were pulled out of the lake and loaded into wagons and taken to the place of delivery by horses. The ice was packed and covered with straw, saw dust and chipped ice to preserve it. This ice was used as needed in ice boxes and coolers. It would last through the summer months, the thicker the ice, the longer it would last. Weather played a very important role in the ice making season determining time and the length. Generally the month of January was considered ice making month.

Ice from Scott's Lake at one time supplied consumers in North Bend and ice was even shipped by rail to Omaha.


Indian Peak

In Section 19 of Morse Bluff Precinct there is an area known as Indian Peak. How many generations of this Morse Bluff area have traveled either by car, bicycle, horse or foot to the bottom of the hills about one-half mile west of Morse Bluff? Then it would be necessary to follow a narrow path. Years ago one first had to slip and slide up a hill of sand, crawl under a fence before proceeding slowly the rest of the way, always upward. The view was one of beauty — spring, summer, autumn or winter. The river valley from bluff to bluff

was visible for miles at the spot called Indian Peak. On clear days the elevators of North Bend, Cedar Bluffs, Fremont, Rogers and Schuyler, Nebraska would be visible. The wiener roasts and nature hikes were enjoyed by school children even when some wandered off and for a short time seemed to be lost.

Legends have Indian Peak as a pow-wow ground for Indian tribes. There are many other tales connected with Indian Peak. How many have been passed down in recent years is not known. There is at least one Indian supposed to be buried here with all his worldly possessions. The ravines in the area showed that Indians made camps. Arrowheads can still be found.

The acres which include Indian Peak were gotten by patent from the Union Pacific by Francis Colton. John McCluhan purchased the land in December 1876. In February 1920 the acres with Indian Peak were sold to Joseph Havelka, whose family had ownership until May 22, 1968 when Adolph Havelka sold the section to Keith Racek, etal. Raceks have cleared many trees from the north, and have cleared a passage from the west making it more accessible for hiking. One may also drive to Indian Peak from the south and east, but if one enjoys the outdoors try the hike up to the top.

Baseball Days

From the early 1900's to the mid-twenties baseball was a very popular sport in the Morse Bluff area. Morse Bluff fielded a well known team during those years. Games were played almost every Sunday afternoon.

Newspaper articles in 1908 gave interesting accounts of the undefeated Morse Bluff team. Fred W. "Bocky" Bockemuehl was the pitcher, only 16 years old. He was paid \$20 a month. He roomed and boarded at Morse Bluff's Seligmann Hotel for \$2 a week and as a side job worked as a grocery store clerk. Equipment for the team consisted of three baseballs and three bats. The baseball diamond was in the Ladenburger pasture north Morse Bluff. The seating consisted of planks on beer barrels for forty. The rest had to stand or sit on the grass. There wasn't a backstop so if the catcher whose only equipment was a face mask and mitt missed the ball he had to chase it. Their manager who for many years was associated with the local baseball teams could always be spotted with his derby hat and wooden leg.

In 1909 to raise money for equipment, new uniforms and a new ball diamond, dances were held at Zakovec's Hall from January to April. The new ball diamond was in the east part of town, north of the city park where the Russell Soukup home now stands. The ball diamond was so damaged by vandals later in the summer that the team had to finish their scheduled games at the Scott's Lake or Ladenburger ball

diamonds.

Teams from North Bend, Schuyler, Snyder, Wahoo, Prague, Colon, Cedar Bluffs, Linwood and Brainard were a few that were on the schedule. They also entered the Saunders County tournament winning it several years.

There are several in the area that recall those baseball years. One player in the later days, Jim Vopalensky lives in Morse Bluff and recalls those games as if they happened yesterday.

Softball

Softball or pugball as it was called in 1936 replaced baseball as a popular past time. Morse Bluff fielded a team for several years being known as one of the outstanding teams in the area. Generally the games were played in the Ladenburger pasture or at the North Bend Ball Park. World War II brought these games to a halt. After the war with improved transportation, anyone from this area found it easier to play with teams in North Bend than to organize a team here where facilities were poor, young men interested in playing were few and money to support a team was not available.

"Bomb" Accident

On May 23, 1905, O.O. Ladenburger, Ray Killian and a few other young men decided to see if the gun powder left in a 15" x 3" lead pipe discarded in a blacksmith's scrap pile in 1902, would burn. The "bomb" was taken to the middle of Ann Street and lit. The explosion that followed literally tore off Ladenburger's right foot. He was taken to a Fremont hospital where his leg from the knee area was amputated. Ray Killeen was running away when a fragment of the pipe struck his hand and ripped off 2 fingers. Another fragment went through the nearby Killian residence and passed within 3 feet of an infant playing on the floor.





Bridges Across the Platte

For years crossing the Platte River was often unreliable and treacherous. As the years rolled by improvements of the bridges made those crossings safe. These improvements were one of the main factors in the decline of business in Morse Bluff.

In 1870 a Fremont man was said to have started a ferry service across the Platte between Morse Bluff and North Bend, Nebraska but failed for lack of customers. Frank Beznoska had a ferry in 1872 which he continued until James Hough constructed a pontoon bridge in 1875. This pontoon bridge was destroyed in 1878.

1880 marked the building of the first permanent




Working on the first permanent wagon bridge across the Platte




Bridge before the 1912 flood

wagon bridge at the cost of \$16,000. This bridge was repeatedly hit by floods and ice gorges. The most disastrous flood of 1912 washed out 28 of the 52 spans. Foot bridges were constructed during the repatching of the wagon bridge during those years.

In 1914 a steel bridge costing \$68,000 funded partly by the state, Dodge and Saunders Counties was constructed. It was a great improvement over the wooden wagon bridge. Two vehicles whether wagons, buggies, Model T or Model A could meet without difficulty.

Bridge between Morse Bluff and North Bend built in 1974


But as time passed cars became wider and trucks became much larger finding the 1914 bridge no longer adequate. A new wider cement bridge was constructed and completed in 1974. One can cross over the Platte River today without realizing it as the surface is much like the oil-topped road on either side. What will the next bridge be like and how long will this one last?

Floods

Early pioneers of the Morse Bluff area living in the lowlands south of the Platte River experienced high waters and flooding conditions from either the river or run-off waters from the hills.

Newspaper items in 1897 mentioned getting a doctor from Cedar Bluffs since their North Bend doctor could not get across the river due to flood conditions. The items also stated that barns east of town had cattle standing in three feet of water, that one farmer lost several head of hogs and another took his cattle to higher ground.

1912 was recalled by several old timers as being one of the most disastrous floods. Twenty-eight of the 52 spans of the bridge across the Platte were destroyed. The railroad east of town had several miles of rails washed out and inundated. Farmland was completely under water, fences destroyed, cattle and other livestock lost or drowned and several farm buildings damaged by high water. The flood waters did not

reach the town proper even though some did cover low areas along the northern edge.

A dike was constructed along the south bank of the river shortly after the 1912 flood. A Dike and Drainage District was formed including the land bordering the dike to secure funds for the maintenance of the dike. This district was dissolved in 1986.

Another group of land owners in an area west of Morse Bluff, having been plagued by run-off water



Flood damage north of Morse Bluff, 1978


from the hills, had a dam constructed in 1965 to check the flow of water into the valley. It is located $3\frac{1}{2}$ mi. west on the Walla farm.

The Platte River floods of 1960 and 1978 caused much damage to lowland property as well as completely washing out sections of hard-top road between the river and town. Inconveniences resulted. High school students had to travel via Schuyler or Fremont to get to school in North Bend. The postal service used various ways to deliver the mail to Morse Bluff. Residents wishing to trade in North Bend walked over make-shift bridges across the gaps in the road to the river bridge. North Bend merchants provided a shuttle service to and from the bridge.

Residents watch the Platte River with wary eyes each spring, wondering if the dike will hold back the raging high waters or if ice jams may cause overflows.

Morse Bluff Town Bands

The Morse Bluff Bohemian Band, active during the early 1930's, performed weekly summer concerts in the center of the street. Bohemian marches, sousedskas, and waltzes were played by the members, mostly of Czech descent. Band members ranged in age from 13 to 43. A concert was held each Memorial Day at the Czech National Cemetery 4 mi. w. of Morse. The village trustees paid the director 50¢ per band member per month. Emil Wolf Sr., president of the Bank of Morse Bluff, provided support for the band. A later band in Morse Bluff, active in the late 1930's, was directed by William Vrana of Linwood for a few years. Members were Frank Vlasak, Lorin Racek, Curtis Fleming, Ray Hanson, Frank Brabec, Louis Stranik, Donald Hines, Edward J. 



Ed Wards

Charlotte Edwards, a nationally known wildlife artist, paints her works of art in her secluded home located two miles east of Morse Bluff. She reflects Nebraska in her paintings, as she has lived and hunted across the state making her very knowledgeable as to the background habitat and many species of wildlife.

She has loved to draw since early childhood but did not paint until the early 1970's when her children began to leave home. Her interest in wildlife probably started early in life. Her romance with her husband, Jack, grew in a duck blind and they have hunted many a mile together. Because of her attraction to him, she went hunting to learn to enjoy the same fun. He, in turn, shares her interest in art and is her best critic.

She started painting with oils but due to the long drying time, has converted to acrylics. She prefers to paint wild-game birds; the only mammals she paints are hunting dogs on occasion. She does not like to paint pictures with man-made objects in them, preferring the natural habitat for the background. One exception is that she does paint decoys.

In the 1970's she was turned down by a gallery in Colorado because she was female and they assumed she would lose interest and not continue her career. She is a very shy but determined person and has won many "Best of Show" awards and ribbons since that time. She uses the pseudonym of *Ed Wards* as her signature on her paintings.

She has been featured in many magazines and newspapers and was featured in the "Shotgunner" in

both April of 1985 and 1986, as one of the top five female wildlife artists in the United States.


She exhibits her art at shows that attract the nation's leading artists of game animals and birds. According to one critic, she is not just another wildlife artist, she is outstanding. Her work has been shown throughout the United States and has earned many awards. She does one-man shows in several states and has shown extensively at invitational shows in the midwest and is a supporter of Ducks Unlimited, by donation of prints and originals.

She has accumulated a collection of outstanding awards since 1977 at Ducks Unlimited Wildlife Art Shows held in Kansas City and Oklahoma Wildlife Art Shows held at Tulsa. Her art work was also chosen for the 1984 New Hampshire Pheasant Stamp and the 1984 Nebraska Habitat Stamp, Canada on Water. In 1984 she was awarded Nebraska ANAC Award of Excellence and was named Sponsor Artist for 1985-86 for Nebraska Ducks Unlimited. She has just recently been commissioned to paint the Kansas Wildlife Trust Fund Habitat Stamp.

Charlotte donated two of her prints to be auctioned off at one of Morse Bluff's Centennial fund raising events, and one of her originals will be awarded to the lucky winner of a raffle drawing at the Centennial celebration.


Jan and Anna Bauer

Jan was a vintner and planted many varieties of grapes on the side of the creek on the original homestead. Anna was a homemaker.






Frank and Rose Blatny




Albert and Lilly Ann Buchholtz






Anton and Mary Chvatal


Anton and Mabel Cippera

He homesteaded 80 acres in Bohemia precinct, the Wilma Dvorak farm 1½ mi. west of town. He received the land patent for the 80 from the General Land Office on 3-10-1866. On 12-10-1866 he sold a tract of land about 100′ wide to the Fremont, Elkhorn and Missouri Valley Railroad for \$22.50 an acre. Besides farming, he ran a ferry across the Platte, later selling it to Frank Beznoska. John died 9-16-1901 and his wife, Mary, died 9-4-1906 at Morse Bluff.

Leonard Hazeltine Dodge Family


Leonard Hazeltine Dodge, born 1833 in Vermont, married Martha Preston in 1867. He died in 1896. Martha died in California in 1910. They had 12 children; Rollen, Addie, Lizza, Maria, Timothy, Joseph, Marky, Myrtle, Hugh, Allison, Ollie and Etta. They farmed ½ mi. west of Morse Bluff on land purchased from the railroad. On the farm homestead a wooden water tank held water from a natural spring. Several times the Dodge family had to take cover and were on the alert with guns pointed at Indians. The Indians had come to get water from the spring and to raid the garden.

The Timothy Brown Dodge Family

Tim Dodge, born 7-14-1889 near Morse Bluff, died 10-5-1941 at Veteran's Hospital, Lincoln, NE. He was married to Lillian Blue. Tim and brother Allison bought the livery barn and managed it for a few years. In the 1920's the family moved to North Bend but maintained an interest in the Morse Bluff community. Tim was a charter member of the American Legion Post #340 and Lillian was a charter member of the Auxiliary. Children: Laurine Martha married Lyle Mylander, living in North Bend; Leonard Timothy was living in North Bend at the time of his death; Rollen died in infancy; and Ralph Max lived in California at the time of his death. There are 2 grandsons and 4 great grandsons in the North Bend area to carry on the Dodge name.












Joe and Leona Fencl

Francis and Mary Fischer



He developed and enlarged his original homestead and raised a family of 4: Thomas, Ada (Tawney), Walter G. and Robert.

Curtis and Jeri Fleming

Curtis D. Fleming, born 1923, continues to live on and farm, with the help of his son Bruce, the family farm, part of which his grandfather homesteaded in 1868. This year is the 119th year that this land has been tilled by the Fleming family. Curtis attended rural Dist. 79 and Morse Bluff and North Bend High Schools. He married Geraldine "Jeri" Moravec (1930) of the Ithaca vicinity in 1952. Jeri, a graduate of Wahoo High School, did secretarial work at UNL. 


Jacob and Anna Franta





Dr. John C. Hubenbecker

Dr. J.C. Hubenbecker delivered almost all the babies born in this area between 1916 and 1960. At the Old Settler's Picnic at North Bend in 1958 over 500 of his babies signed a memory book. Dr. Hubenbecker was known as one of the best diagnostic men in his field. His "tall" stories were part of his remedy as he believed that a good dose of laughter was part of the remedy. Dr. Hubenbecker came to Morse Bluff in 1916 after graduating from Creighton University and interning at a hospital in Denver. He continued his practice, making house calls and seeing patients in his office until a few months before his death in 1962. In 1946 he moved his office to North Bend but lived in Morse until his health failed and it was necessary for him to be closer to medical assistance. Dr. Hubenbecker was born at McCool Junction, NE. 

John, was born in Bohemia 10-12-1876 to Mr. and Mrs. John Janovec who immigrated to U.S. in 1892 homesteading in the Bohemia precinct. John attended Fremont Normal School in 1897-1898 and then worked in the Bank of Morse Bluff. In 1900 John bought and operated a general store in North Bend. In 1906 he sold that business and purchased the Hines and Vopalensky Hardware at Morse; in 1910 he added a furniture and undertaking business. On 6-12-1902, he married Emily, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Anton Soukup. They had a son, Raymond. John was City Clerk and a member of the Dist. 14 school board, Z.C.B.J., and Ancient Order of United Workmen.

Jakub and Josephine Jelinek

Jakub Jelinek was born in 1829 in Srkovice, Moravia, Austria, where Josephine was also born. They immigrated to the U.S. in 1871, settling w. of Morse Bluff and farming. They had wanted to homestead by Cedar Hill but due to the fact that he served as an orderly taking care of the General's Horse, he was not technically a Veteran and could not receive certain homestead benefits that they needed. Instead, they settled s.e. of Morse, directly n. and e. of the present Curtis Fleming farm. They had a large family; some of the children are buried in the Fleming cemetery. Mr. Jones exchanged help with Walter Fleming Sr. who helped him build his house. In return he cut weeds in the corn by hoe for Walter. Walter and Robert Fleming played with the Jones children; they were students at Dist. 54. As the children grew up, the family moved to Omaha.

Barta and Mary Kadlec

Barta and Mary Urban Vasina Kadlec lived on the northeast corner of Third and Kate Streets in a home built by J.P. Shavlik. They were married 4-20-1909. Mary's 3 children - Charles, Ethel, and Marie Vasina - lived with them. Mary was a professional seamstress. Many young ladies learned to sew using her instructions. Her work included new dresses as well as mending and remodeling. During the depression years this was a full time occupation. Barta Kadlec died in 1934. Mary continued making her home here with the exception of the summer months when she worked in the resort areas west of Minneapolis. She sold her home on 3rd and Kate in 1946 and moved to a mobile home on the lot west of the Post Office. Later she made her home with her daughters and at Birchwood Manor where she died 8-3-1970 at the age of 93.

Frank, born 6-6-1867, Bohemia, son of Anton and Anna Kaplan and Mary, born 6-13-1881, Rescue, NE to Jan and Antonia Haba. were married 6-26-1906 at Prague, NE. Children: Helen (6-20-1907) George (2-1-1909 to 7-11-1986), Emil (8-22-1911 to 3-27-1965), and Emma (8-28-1913 to 4-27-1923). Frank immigrated to the U.S. in 1891 and to Nebraska in 1896. He spent 9 years as a laborer before entering the harness business in 1900. Frank was active in civic affairs serving as Justice of Peace, 1904-1906 and served as a councilman for many years. During World War I he worked in behalf of the Z.C.B.J. Lodge, Plzen #9 of which he was a member in support of Liberty Loan Drives and other benefits for the Czechoslovakian Army and National Council. Frank and Mary lived on Kate Street Frank died 9-11-1940 and Mary, 12-6-1969. Their daughter, Helen. active in the Methodist Church and Sunday School, taught at District #91 for 5 years and in Cedar Bluffs 41 years before retiring in 1971. On 6-1-1970 she married Cecil J. Dey and now lives in Gresham, NE.



Rudolph E. and Emma Kavan




Frederick and Augusta Keller




Frank and Sarah Krause



The Moritz Ladenburg Family

Moritz was born 9-14-1839 in Zobingen, Wurtemburg, Germany. He married Caroline Krause (6-12-1846 - 7-21-1891). He came to the U.S. in 1866, was in the saloon business in Chicago 3 years, moved to Fremont, NE, where he owned and operated the first brewery in that city for 5 years, and homesteaded 80 acres on Sand Creek in Saunders County in 1868. In the early 1900's he owned 70 acres n. of Morse Bluff. Caroline died in 1891; Moritz married Anna Uhl in 1893 and moved to Columbus, NE in 1903. Children: Joseph, Arthur, Otto, Valentine, Mrs. H.F. Malloy, Elizabeth of Dodge, Mrs. Ed Branigan of Columbus, Anna, Rosa, and Katherine of Columbus. Four daughters died as infants: Ida, Sophia, Ottilia, and Anna. They are buried at St. Mary's cemetery, Cedar Bluffs.



O. O. Ladenburger

O.O. "Sticks" Ladenburger, remembered for his derby hat and cane, was a familiar sight at Morse Bluff baseball games, either keeping score or managing the team. He was well known in Saunders County where he conducted cornhusking contests. He helped his father farm until he was 21, then worked for others and after 1910 conducted a poolroom and confectionery business in Morse Bluff. In later years he operated carnival concessions throughout the state at county fairs. O.O.
