Their children were: Robert, who served in World War II and became an eye doctor; and Carol, who married and died in her thirties. All the Lehmers are deceased.

### Richard and Darlene Limbach

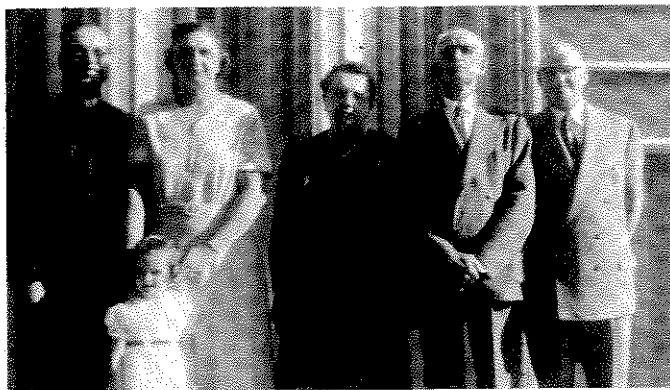

### The Livanec Family

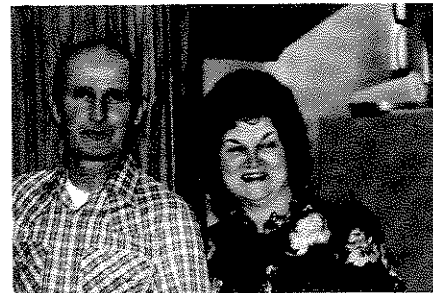

Frank (9-11-1930) is the oldest of the 4 sons of Frank and Mary Lodi. His brothers are Joe and Lad of Fremont and Roy of Kansas City. Frank married Erma Umstoto Jenkins (7-4-1933) of Council Bluffs, IA on 6-28-1983. Frank works for Lodi Construction. He has 5 children and Erma also has 5 children. They have 19 grandchildren.

Frank J. Lodi Sr., born in Czechoslovakia, came to this area in 1918. On 9-25-1928 at Wahoo, NE, he married Marie Lorenc, born in Weston, NE. They first lived on a farm 4 mi. south and 5 mi. west of Morse. In 1931 they moved to the Bartosh farm and in 1936 to Walla's farm. In 1949 they moved to their own farm 1 mi. south and 2 mi. west of town. Besides farming, Frank J. owned and operated a threshing machine. He did the threshing for the neighbors, usually two to three weeks, after which all the families had a picnic at the Platte River. Frank's hobby was making home brew and wine.



### Leopold and Katherine Mares

Leopold was born 10-10-1870 to Thomas (1848-1916) and Mary Mares (1848-1888) on a homestead s.w. of Morse. Thomas came from Switzerland and Mary also from Europe. Leopold had a sister and a half-sister. He worked on the railroad west to Denver, and in meat packing houses in Omaha; later he farmed. Leopold married Katherine Brych, born 8-18-1872 in Czechoslovakia. She came to the U.S. in 1877, settling near Yankton, S.D. They averted disaster when her father decided not to sail on the scheduled date, instead leaving the next day; the earlier ship sank. Katherine did housework in Omaha for Paxton and Gallagher. Leopold and Katherine were parents of Jenny Bartunek, Jerry, Mary Brennan, Ella Curda, Leo, Katherine Wesely, Alvin, Adeline Loranzen, and Adolph. Two daughters died in infancy. (Daughter Jenny Bartunek was a well-known seamstress in Morse, doing alterations and custom sewing in her clients homes, sometimes staying several days. She later moved to North Bend, sewing in her home.) Katherine loved music and dancing, so after the day's work, she taught her children to dance, using an old Victrola. Leopold died 10-1-1956; Katherine 6-13-1959, and both are buried at Killian's Cemetery.

Both were members of St. George's Catholic Church. George was one of the first trustees of the church and Marie was active in church organizations. Morse was their home for 44 years. until November 1985 when they moved to Wahoo, NE. The Marshaleks have 3 daughters and 10 grandchildren: Mrs. Howard (Gladys) Pearson, Wahoo, 3 sons; Mrs. Arthur (Alice) Matous, Lincoln, 3 girls; and Mrs. Gary (Elaine) Cole, Austin, TX, 3 boys and 1 girl.



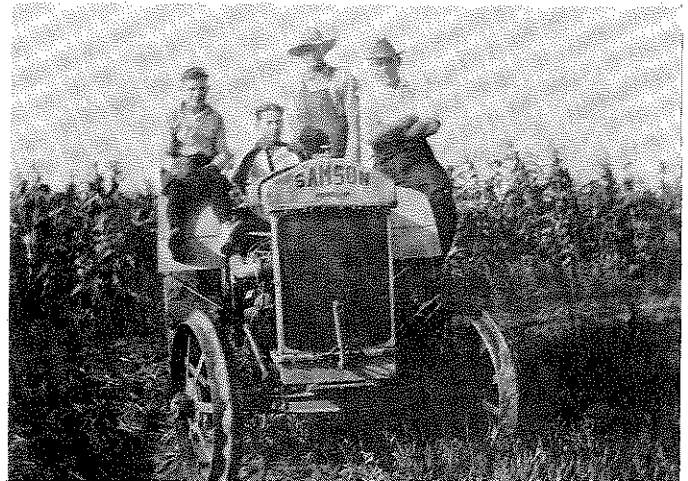

Ira, son of John and Leah Hogue McCluhan and Mary B. Navrkal were married in Nov. 1897. Fred, a native of Schleswig-Holstein, Germany, and son of Hans and Annie Stultenburg Miller, left Europe when 11 years old coming to Fort Calhoun, NE. They lived there 3 years, then moved to Omaha where he worked in a saloon 3½ years, and then opened his own saloon which he operated 5 years. He sold this to operate the Gittleman's Brewing Company's Place in Omaha for 3 years. He then moved to Morse and built a hotel which was known for its good reputation, not only in Saunders County but with businessmen across the state. He had 3 brothers and one sister living in Washington County. In 1897 he was married to Barbara, daughter of John and Teresa Pabian of Omaha; they had no children. She died 3-9-1960 and is buried at the Scribner cemetery.



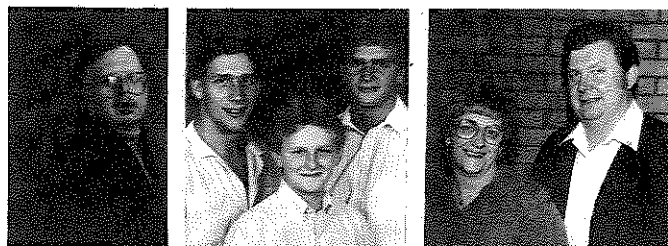
**Steve and Sharen Minarick**

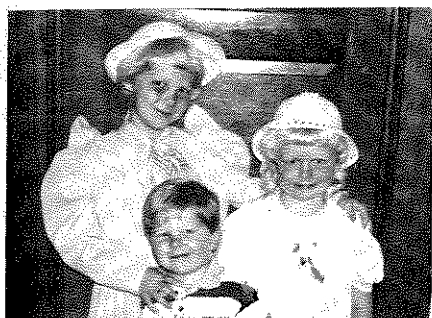

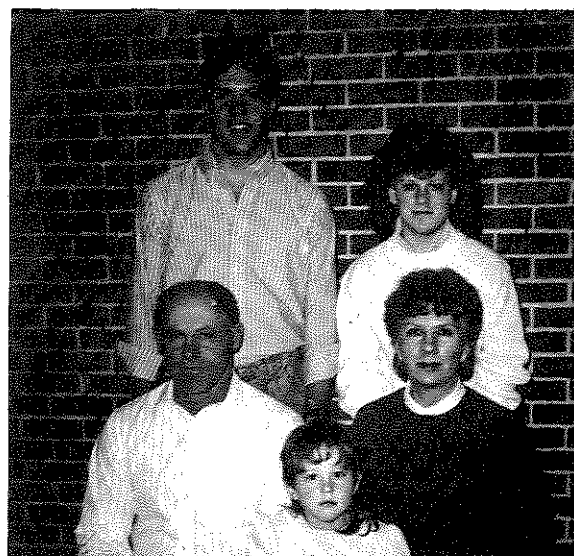

### Frank and Antonia Navrkal

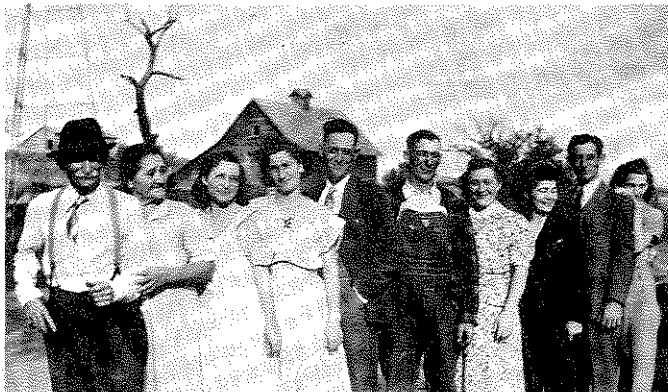

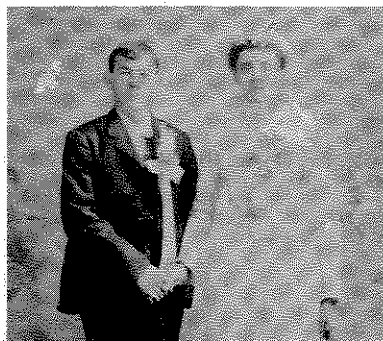

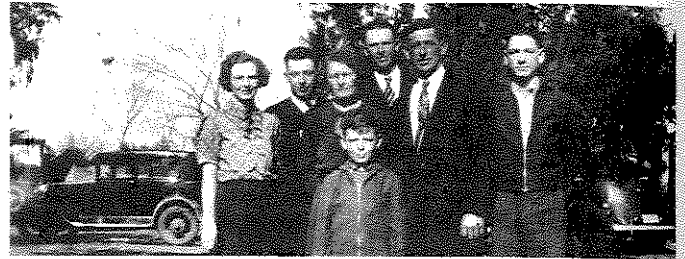

## George and Emma Otte

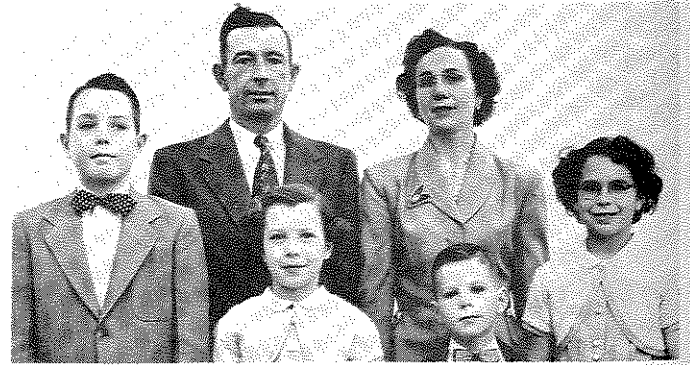

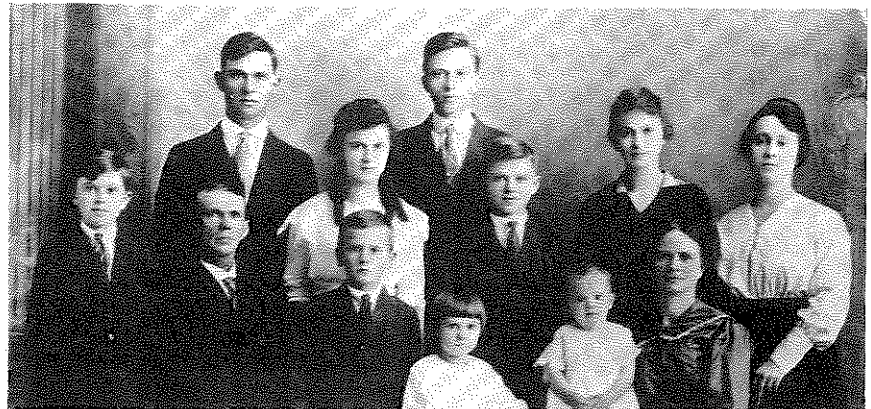
### Duane and Pamela Pabian

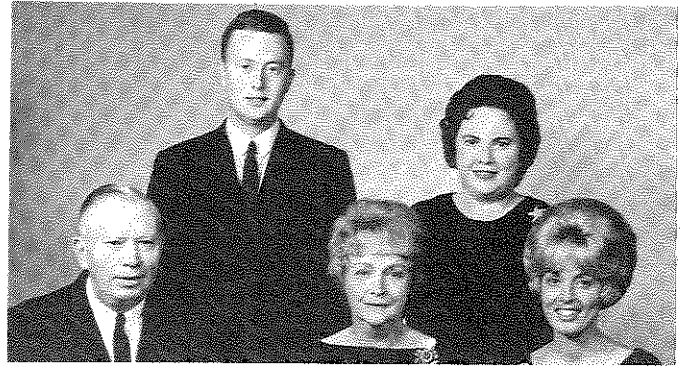

### George and Bess Pabian

George Pabian, Sr. (1900-1981), born Prague, NE and Bess Riemenschneider (1904-1986), born Cody, NE were married 9-10-1924 at Martin, S.D. Children: Bonnie Roberts, Marilyn Machacek and George H. ### The Joe Pabian Family

Joe was born to Mr. and Mrs. Joe Pabian in Koute Domazlice, Bohemia near the city of Plzen in 1836. In 1878 he came to America with his brother, John, and father, Joe. Settling first in Omaha and later moving to a homestead about 5 mi. s.w. of Morse Bluff, Joe farmed 1 mi. w. of brother John. Joe and his wife and eight children: Dora Wagner, Katherine Schroeder Vopalensky, John J., Joe B., Albert, Mary Ruzek, Mike, and Frank. Tragedy struck the family when Frank and Albert were accidentally drowned in the Platte River. The family were Catholics. The parents, and sons Frank and Albert are buried at Cedar Hill.

### Joe C. and Lena Pabian

Joe C., born 9-21-1866 in Koute Domazlice, Czechoslovakia, came to U.S. in 1876, living first at Omaha and later moving to a farm near Morse Bluff with his parents, John and Therese Pabian. Lena, born 10-15-1871 in Omaha, NE, to Nicholas and Sarah Wagner, married J.C. Pabian in Fremont, NE on 1-12-1891. They moved to a farm near Prague, NE. Joe was active in the Catholic church at Cedar Hill. In his younger days he played the accordion for many dances in the area. They had 10 children: Libbie Racek, Agnes Hines, Ernest, Hilda Dolezal, George, Leonard, Emil, Victor, Leona Hampl, and Joie. Joe and Lena retired from the farm in 1926, buying a home on the w. edge of Morse on Second Street. They celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in 1941. J.C. died 1-1-1945; Lena died 8-26-1964. They are buried at Cedar Hill.



### John and Therese Pabian

John Pabian was born in 1836 in Koute Domazlice, Bohemia. He came to U.S. in 1876 with his brother, Joe, and his father, Joe Pabian Sr. The rest of the family remained in Czechoslovakia, where the father planned to return after he helped his sons get established in a new land. Hard times never allowed him to return. He is buried at Cedar Hill while his wife is buried in Bohemia. Therese Spetl Pabian was born 10-11-1834 in Zahorny, Bohemia. The Pabians had 8 children: John (1859-1939), Barbara Miller, Joe Charles (1866-1945), Mary Kenyon (1870-1934), James (1871-1950), Frank (1880-1950), and twins - the boy died at age 4, the girl at age 8, both buried in Bohemia. John died in 1895; Therese in August of 1916. They are buried at Cedar Hill Cemetery.

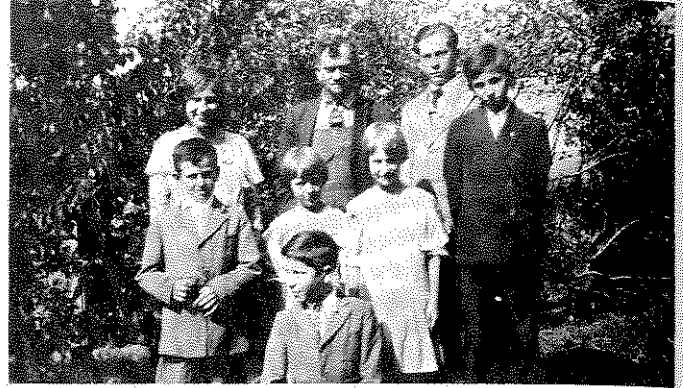
### Leonard and Helen Pabian

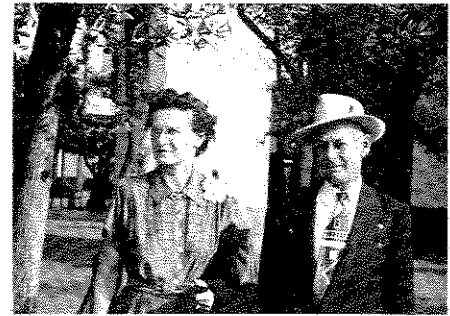

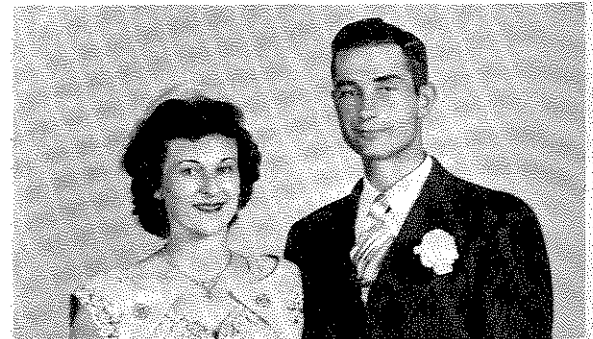

### John W. and Frances Paseka

John W. Paseka Jr., born 4-9-1880 in Butler County, NE, was brought to Saunders County as a boy. He farmed several years, and served as mail carrier. He farmed and operated a saloon in Prague which he later sold, buying a quarter section of land. He traded this later for a hotel in Morse Bluff. He also owned and operated the cement block factory at Morse Bluff. He married Frances Sedlacek, daughter of Anton and Mary Sedlacek 4-28-1900. Children: John, Mary, Arnie, Leonard, Jerome, and Leo. John was a school director, a Catholic, and member of Ancient Order of United Workmen.

### Mike and Barbara Placek

Mike, born 1-28-1859 to John and Barbara Placek, and Barbara Wesely, born in 1859, were both born in Czechoslovakia. Mike immigrated to America with his parents in 1867, arriving in the Port of New York by steamship. Mike and Barbara were married in 1879. Joseph was born 11-26-1870 in Omaha to Albert and Anna Prai. Joseph grew up by Linwood where his father homesteaded. He and F.B. Datel had a store in Morse for 3 years. He sold out and moved to Prague. He married Helen Tvrz of Wilber 3-28-1893, the daughter of Anton and Jennie Tvrz. Children: Lydia, Joseph E., Harold, Irene, Julius, Clara, and Karl. Helen died 12-24-1941; Joseph 1-13-1943.

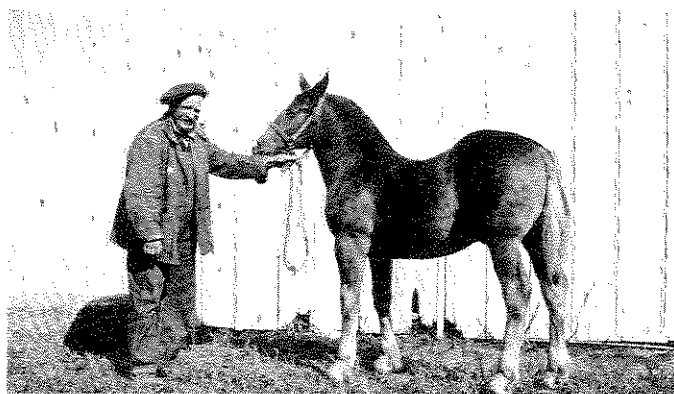

Several are seen daily going for their mail, visiting with the neighbors or working in their yards and gardens.

### William J. Quackenbush

William (Bill) Quackenbush lived in the Morse Bluff area from 1912 to 1967. He was a familiar sight coming to town with his horse and buggy with a dog or two either in the buggy or along side. Many of the years he lived east of town. One would have never considered him an intellectual from his personal appearance or manner of living. Many teachers often read poetry he had written for some special event. They used his poetry as an example that one could not judge an individual by his outward appearance. Bill was born 1871 in Minnesota. In 1899 he enlisted in the army serving until 1902. He farmed near Fairbury, NE, married and lost his first wife. He then moved to Omaha, served on the police force and later worked on the Rock Island Railroad, arriving in Morse Bluff about 1912. He worked as a carpenter and mason. He married Laura Wilson Schuler. She died in 1936. He is generally remembered as caretaker of Wolf's sand and gravel pits. Bill died 4-27-1967 at the age of 93.



### Edward and Anna Racek

Edward, born 9-21-1878, married Anna Hines, born 10-3-1888. They moved to a farm 1½ mi. s. of Morse which his father purchased from Mary Levy for \$88.00 an acre. A daughter Libby was born on Sept. 9, 1907, and died 7-1-18. A son Raymond was born 4-12-11. Edward's occupation was farming. He and Anna were married 12-11-06. He died on 1-29-37, Anna on 7-24-63.

A woman of many interests, she enjoyed needlework, gardening, historical scrapbooks, and collections. Joe died 4-11-1967 and Libbie died 9-7-1986. They are buried at Cedar Hill.

Lorin was born 11-8-23 to Joe and Libbie Racek on their farm near Morse. Nadine was born 9-25-26 near Prague, NE, to John and Emma Ladenburger. They were married at St. John's Catholic Church in Prague 8-12-48. Lorin farmed in the area all his life in addition to playing saxophone/clarinet in area bands for 25 years. Nadine attended Fremont Midland College and St. Mary's College in Omaha, taught school 7 years, has baked professionally 35 years, and is a member of the Altar Society and Church Choir. Nadine, Lorin and son Larry, born 8-13-49, live on the farm homesteaded by the Racek family. Larry farms, does custom work, serves on Dist. 54 school board, and the fire department. 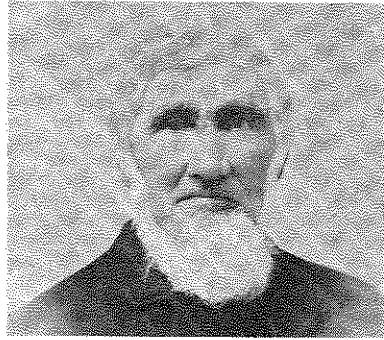

### Mathias and Maria Racek

Mathias (Mike) Racek, born 1-7-1819 in Czechoslovakia, the son of Mathias and Anna Racek, married Maria Suchy on 11-8-1842 in Pollenka, Czechoslovakia. She was born 2-21-1824 to Lorenz and Veronica Suchy in Czechoslovakia. At the time of Mike and Maria's marriage, the name was spelled Raczek. In the 1860's, they immigrated to the state of Illinois with their 5 children: Mike Jr., James, Joe, Mary, and Anna. Mike worked for a cattle feeder for a year before setting out for Nebraska with an old team of horses, a covered wagon, a horned cow and 25¢ in his pocket. Near Cedar Rapids, IA, one of their horses died and they stayed for more than a year. In 1868, they started again for Nebraska. They followed the north side of the Platte River to North Bend. Since the river was too deep to cross, an Indian guided them to a crossing near Linwood. After searching for a homestead, they located 3 eighths s. of Morse. This land is still owned by Racek descendants. After Mike Jr., and James got their homestead claims, they worked in Omaha 3 days a week leveling hills at 25¢ a day. The walk to Omaha took 1 day and the walk back another, leaving 2 days per week to farm. Mike Jr. married Anna Kavan, and James married Veronica Beznoska. Joe married Barbara Kohout. Mary married Taylor Slack and Anna married John Mensik. Maria Racek, the mother of the 5, was killed by the horned cow. She is buried on the hillside e. of Morse in an abandoned cemetery with unmarked graves. Mathias Racek is buried in the Killian Cemetery west of Morse Bluff.

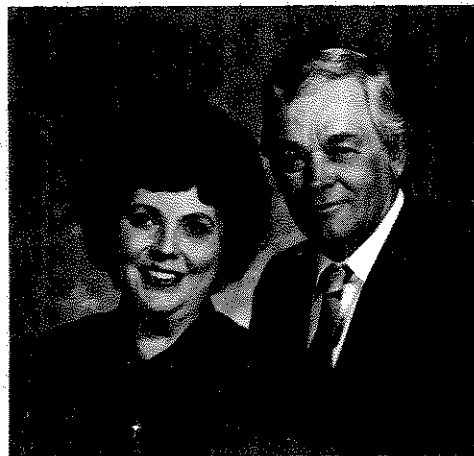

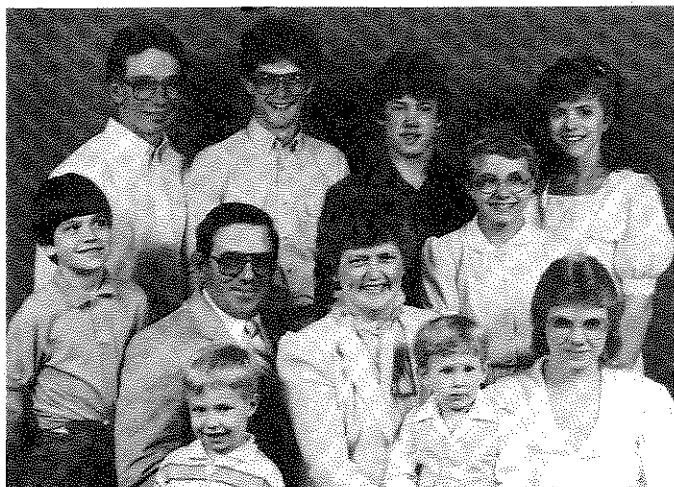

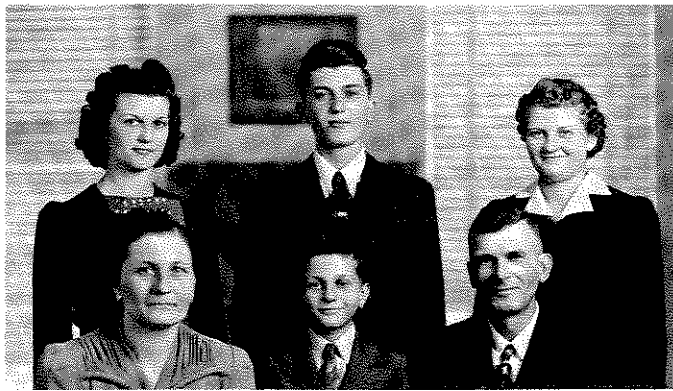

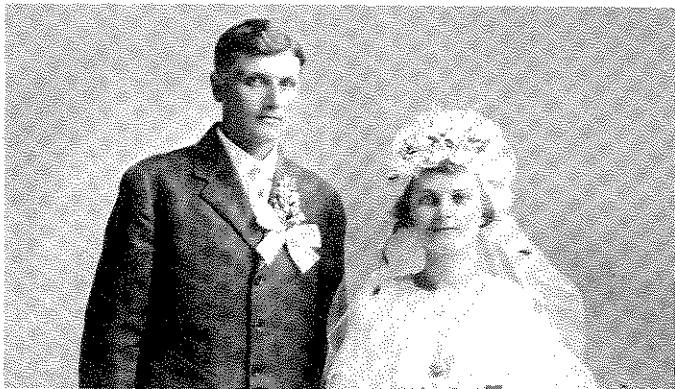


### John and Veronica Virka

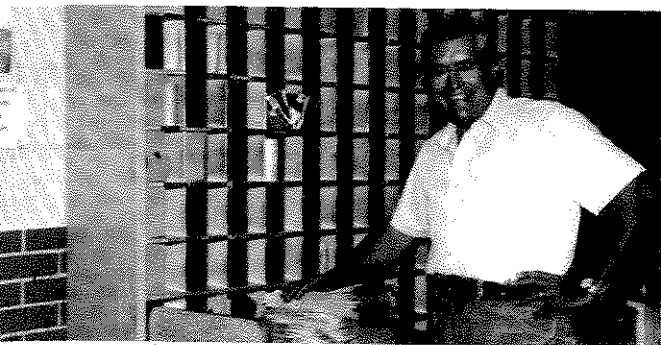

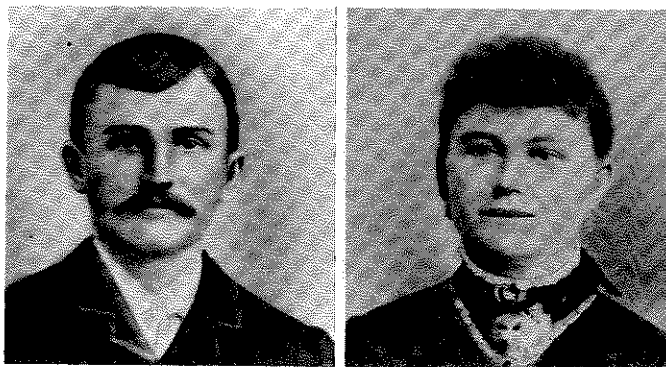


### Albert and Clara Vopalensky

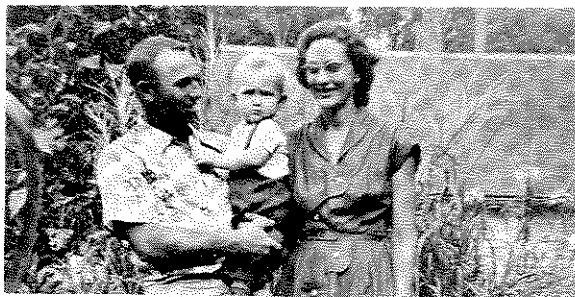

### Frank L. and Libbie Vopalensky

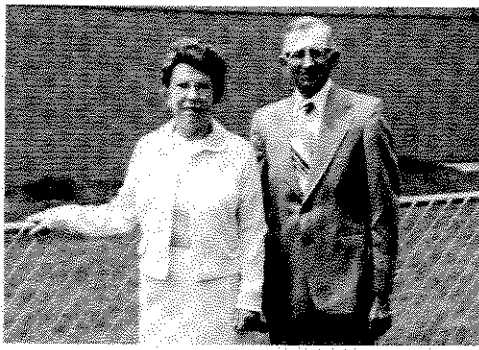

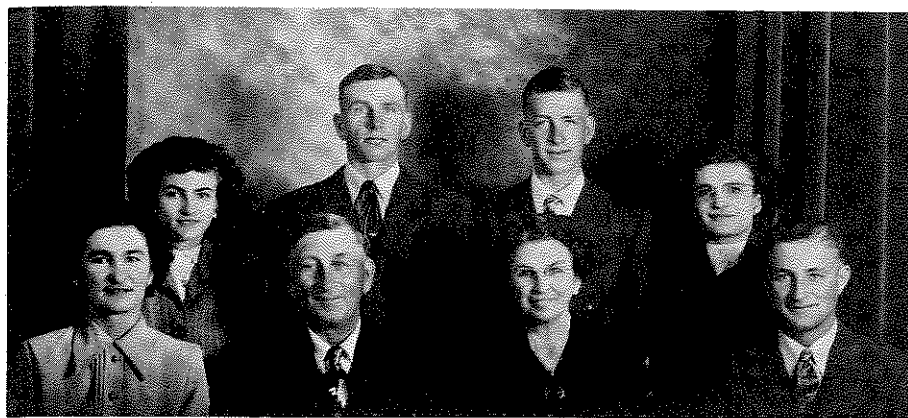

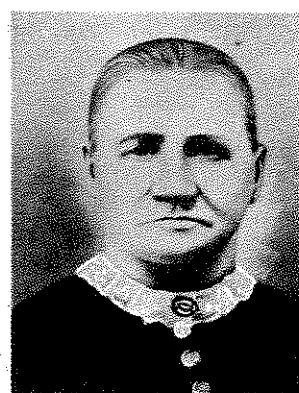

### Nicholas and Sarah Wagner

Nicholas, born 3-4-1821, had 7 brothers and 1 sister, and lived in Alsace-Lorraine. He served in the French army 12 years, immigrated to New York, then lived in Florence while he worked at a saw mill in Omaha. He paid for boat passage for the trip to the U.S. for his friend, Sarah Mistler (or Mishler), 11-24-1834, born to a poor family in Bavaria. Sarah worked as a maid for Kountses Brewery in Omaha. Nick and Sarah were married a year later and lived in a log cabin near Florence where their son Lewis was born. A few years later, Nick joined a caravan of 14 covered wagons headed for the Gold Rush. Overtaken by Indians, a number of men were killed and all but 1 wagon destroyed. The rest walked on and worked in the gold mines. He used most of his gold to return home, walking all summer. Later he decided to return to Germany, but the family soon came back to Omaha where he worked again. In 1872, they homesteaded 80 acres of land s.w. of Morse, and lived the rest of their lives in the area. They had 10 children: Lewis, Nicholas, Lena Pabian, Anne, Ed, and Henry. 4 others died as infants. Sarah died 5-3-1909, age 75. Nicholas died 3-3-1900, age 79. Both Catholics, they are buried at Cedar Hill Cemetery.

### John Walla Sr. Family

John Walla Sr., a Saunders Co. pioneer of the Morse Bluff vicinity, came in 1872 with his wife and four sons; John Jr., Frank, Anton and Phillip. The Wallas were considered well-to-do as they brought over \$6,000 in currency from Czechoslovakia. They had divided the money into four amounts and carried it in flannel bags tied to their persons underneath their clothing. With this money, John bought three 80's of railroad land @ \$1,700 each, and bought stock and farm equipment. He also helped other settlers buy their equipment and seed. John Jr. and Phillip remained on the original land acquired by John Sr. Their descendants live on the original land in 1987.

### Edward and Gusta Walla

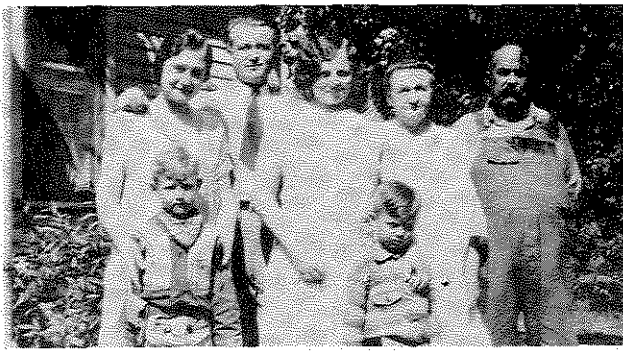

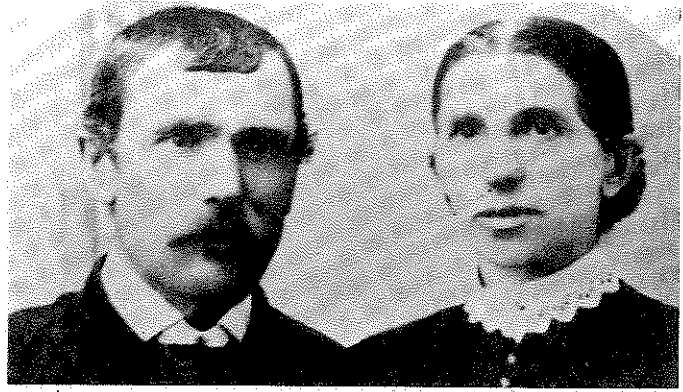
### Frank and Mary Zakovec
