OSBORNE COUNTY

Osborne County lies in the second row of counties south from Nebraska and is the first county west of the 6th Meridian. It has 11,196 inhabitants from which there are five families of Czechs who settled in the northwest part of the county. Topography is more or less largely rolling. However, it reads sort of rolling. Assessment of value of county is \$2,492,283 against which the public debt, school and community is \$150,842.

PHILLIPS COUNTY

Phillips County lies near Nebraska and is the fourth county west of the 6th Meridian. It has 13,067 inhabitants. Phillipsburg is the county seat. Topography in the county is gently rolling and soil in the most part promising. The Czechs, in as much as I found names, are two families and their members live here and quite a distance. The valuation of the county is \$2,686,333 with the public debt of \$257,841. Cost of the land from \$5 to \$15 per acre.
